Beloved.

Greetings in Christ! I give thanks to God for you, and you are in my prayers daily. Your faithfulness shows God's love in beautiful ways.

October 31 is Reformation Day: the anniversary of Martin Luther's famous action of nailing a list of 95 objections to the path the Catholic church had been following. A monk himself, he studied the Scriptures and used them as a lens in which to examine the teachings and practices of the church, and recognized the need for critical reform. This action inspired—or perhaps emboldened—other individuals to turn a discerning eye toward the faith and its institutions.

As Presbyterians, we trace our tradition to John Calvin. However, there are many aspects to Calvin's work that we have continued to reflect upon and reform, in light of further divine revelation and the lessons of experience, all tempered by the guiding principle of God as Love, and the foundation of the Scriptures as—in part—a blueprint for faithful living grounded in love.

The Presbyterian Church (USA) has many mottos, and among them is this: Reformed and Always Reforming, According to the Will of God. This phrase is a recognition that the church is a human institution, and is therefore imperfect. Our history reflects our heritage as a scion of the Reformation. Our present reflects our constant practice of discerning God's will for the church. Sometimes that means we are strengthened in our convictions, and sometimes it means that we must humbly reassess our convictions, repent, and move forward in grace.

Always being reformed according to the will of God is a difficult thing. It upsets the status quo, breaks open our self-assuredness, and allows us to grow in new ways. As we celebrate the Reformation, let us remember the courage of those first reformers, and follow in their footsteps to speak and act boldly as a reflection of God's love for the world.

I pray God's grace and peace attend you.









Fall is in the air and we are taking advantage of the cooler temperatures and Lockerly

The book selection for October is *Inheritance: A Memoir of Genealogy, Paternity, and Love* by Dani Shapiro. Have you ever thought about having a DNA test to find our more about your background? The author decided to do just that and through that DNA test, she received the astonishing news that her beloved deceased father was not her biological father! This secret had been kept from her for more than fifty years by the author's family out of shame and self-protectiveness. This book tells the story of Shapiro's urgent quest to unlock the truth of her

own identity and to find her biological father. This is an amazing detective story with surprising twists and turns along the way.

The book selection for November is *No Ordinary Assignment: A Memoir* by Jane Ferguson. The author is a special correspondent for *PBS News Hour* and has been a visiting professor of war reporting at Princeton University. Ferguson's book chronicles her unlikely journey from bright, inquisitive child in war torn Northern Ireland to intrepid war correspondent. Without family wealth or connections, she began as a one-woman reporting team, a borrowed camera her only equipment. While other reporters chased "bang-bang shoot'em up" stories, she sought to give voice to civilian experiences of war. With this goal in mind, she has covered nearly every war front and humanitarian crisis of our time. One reviewer of her book wrote that "Jane Ferguson's breathtaking memoir takes us inside the savage wars of the last two decades with a greater immediacy and compassion than any news report".

Please come and join us as we meet to discuss two very different books. As always, they both should be very interesting reads.

black" financially. We must continue all the usual supports: food, funds, and prayers. Personal anecdote: I was in a grocery store this week, filling in the gaps for our distribution, talking with the woman ahead of me in the check-out line about this ministry. When she reached the cashier, she said "put her order on my bill", which she did, and saved a valuable \$27.00 for our budget. You never know what your witness will bring out! "Thank Thee! 




ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL


