



One new woman came at the end of the last day, apologizing for coming at all, not feeling "entitled" but doing what she had to do. I was so glad we had one bag left for her!

I have been glad, as well, to have a faithful group of college students for the past several weeks who have come to help pack bags on Mondays and distribute on Tuesdays. Our own Masoma has begun helping when she can and is a great asset to the team. In December the calendars, Christmas cards, notepaper, etc. that you have provided will be made available for folks to choose. We are still accepting these items if you have some to share. Thank you for continuing to contribute food items and funds to

this ministry. You can tell from the numbers above that we are




CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We're trying something new! A Crochet Sunday School Class started the last week in October. The class has been focused on learning to crochet but we are now delving


into meditation and explorations of faith. Join us in this new adventure on **Sunday**

A focus of Cheryl's ministry is working with the CCAP to safeguard the rights of children by developing child protection policies and implementing them in schools. Of particular emphasis is protecting young girls against violence and empowering them to continue their schooling.
