



Beloved,

Grace and peace to you! I am grateful for this beautiful church family. There are so few congregations like us, and I am so fortunate to be your pastor.

Most of you know that the Triduum and Easter is a difficult time for me. Two years ago, my mom closed her eyes for the last time on Maundy Thursday, and she died on Easter Sunday. The confluence of grief and the celebration of the Resurrection makes the holiest days difficult to navigate.

I share this because I know how hard it is to live into the resurrection life while grieving. We all carry some grief, whatever loss we've experienced. "Trusting in the hope of the resurrection" can sound trite. And yet Easter Sunday—the day of Resurrection—is still our holiest day. Each year, we still pull out all the stops (literally—all the organ stops are pulled!), sound the horns, bedeck ourselves and the cross in flowers and finery, and turn to family as we begin a new season. This new season coincides with lengthening days, the pale green of new leaves, and the riot of blossoms and birdsong. In other words, Easter signifies new life, reflected in the new life proclaimed by nature living into warmer, sunnier days after the relative dark and cold of winter.

Just as we trust in Spring each year, we are called also to trust in the Resurrection. In Christ's resurrection, we are invited into new life. This is no substitutionary atonement it is participation in Christ's life. Christ died before us, and prepares new life before us. Death is still a reality, as is grief, but it is not the final word. Love is. Love is the reason we grieve, and love is the reason we live.

I bid you a most blessed Easter season, with and in spite of whatever grief you carry. Trust in the hope of the resurrection.




### **CONGREGATIONAL FELLOWSHIP**

The First Presbyterian Church Book Club will hold its April meeting on Thursday, **April 11th at 2 PM in the church parlor.** We will be discussing *The 272: The Families Who Were Enslaved and Sold to Build the American Catholic Church* by Rachel Swarns. This book has been selected as the best book of the year by several major publications. The author tells the story of a group of America's most

prominent Catholic priests who in 1838 sold 272 enslaved people to finance their largest mission project, which is now Georgetown University. The author follows one family through nearly two centuries of indentured servitude and enslavement. The author's reporting on this one family's story has started a national conversation about reparation and reconciliation in America.

The book selection for the month of May is *Undaunted Courage: Meriwether Lewis, Thomas Jefferson, and the Opening of the American West* from the *New York Times* best selling author Stephen Ambrose. This book about the Lewis and Clark exploration of the Louisiana Territory tells the story of the most momentous expedition in American history and one of the greatest adventure stories of all times. In 1803 Thomas Jefferson selected Captain Meriwether Lewis and his partner Captain William Clark to lead a voyage up the Missouri River to the Rocky Mountains, down the Columbia River to the Pacific Ocean and back.

The book club members would like to express their appreciation to all of the church members that came to our February meeting to hear the local author Marsha Fort Herren talk about her book. It was an amazing, enjoyable event. I am not sure who enjoyed it more, the audience or the author. It was just plain fun. She talked about her book, shared some of her recipes, and displayed some of her current paintings.

They are part of a community of faith.






### **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**



#### ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL



#### FELLOWSHIP SUNDAY SCHOOL




We are studying Contrarian's Guide to Knowing God: Spirituality for the Rest of Us by Larry Osborne. This group meets in person in the



Install an enclosed shed for maintenance equipment. Inspect our buildings for termite activity and install termite traps. Repair and seal our attic space from small nesting wildlife. Cut oak tree limbs that were over our fellowship hall roof. Have our narthex inspected for floor and wall structural damage. Continued and in some cases begun repairs on the exterior wood trim around our stained glass windows. Cleaned every single gutter and downspouts. Improved and restored our landscaping on all sides.

On March 16th, Sherry, Pat, Will, Andrew Lindsay, Susan, Bob, Cathy, Joe, Sue, and Charles all gathered. It was comforting to work side by side with another crew, Gloria, Anne, Margaret, Rev. Susan and Lois.
