Session Notes

RESPECTFULLY SUBMITTED, SUSAN MCGILL, CLERK OF SESSION

- Upon review of the Articles of Incorporation and the recently approved By-Laws, the following motions were approved by the Session:
 1. Amend paragraph 7 of the Articles of Incorporation to read "shall consist of no fewer than five and no more than 12 persons" (regarding membership of the Session/Board of Trustees); John Bradley will submit the change through the Georgia Secretary of State website.
 2. To ensure that the Treasurer of the Church and the Treasurer of the Corporation are the same officer, the following changes to the By-Laws will be requested at the next Congregational Meeting: 1) Add "The Session shall nominate a Treasurer to be elected by the congregation at its annual meeting." to Article V, section G; and 2) Delete "and Treasurer." from Article IX, Section C.
- A motion to study the Book of Jeremiah for the Sunday School class with commentary as resource for conversation was approved.
- Building and Property Committee reports that Phase 1 repairs on the roof have been completed and they are in the process of identifying proposed repairs for Phase 2.
- A motion to secure Dale Chapin as supply pastor for the following dates: June 28, September 6, and November 22 was approved.
- A motion to invite Laura Baarda to preach on May 24th was approved.
- A motion to extend an invitation to the NEGA Presbytery that FPC—Milledgeville would like to host the Feb 27, 2027 meeting was approved.
- A motion to add three new Elders to the Session to create a class of 2029 was approved. (Committee composition to be determined at a later date.)

Pentecost Sunday: Wear Red

On Sunday, May 24, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. This day marks the "birthday of the church," and it feels particularly poignant as we continue our own Bicentennial journey. To celebrate the fire and movement of the Spirit among us for these 200 years, all are invited to wear red to worship that morning as we fill our sanctuary with the color of the day.

This service will be a special highlight of our Bicentennial season. Our music will pay tribute to our rich history as we feature the work of former choir director Clyde Tipton. Laura Baarda to the pulpit to share the Word with us. It is a joy to have someone who grew up in this church return to lead us in worship during such a significant year.

FPC Food Pantry

We had a slightly less busy month at Food Pantry in April, with 38 families served, 3 of whom were new. The fact that we have new families coming every month indicates there is a continuing need and that people who need us are learning of our presence.

The only day we did not run out of bags early (usually by 9:45) was the Tuesday after Easter, when people apparently assumed we would not be open. One day, everything was gone in 8 minutes, a new record. People usually had to be asked to return another time. Some of them were pleased to be able to take home pet food, even if not "people food" as our friends at Oconee Area Humane Society (out of Greensboro) have kept us well supplied.

Community donors as well as FPC members have helped our budget and all of the donated items are appreciated. One of our college students brought in dried fruit, as did a community donor, and the folks were happy to get it for baking and snacking. Please continue to support this vital outreach through your donations and prayers. God is working among us!

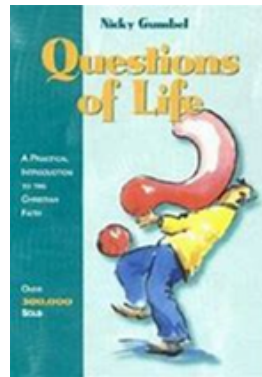
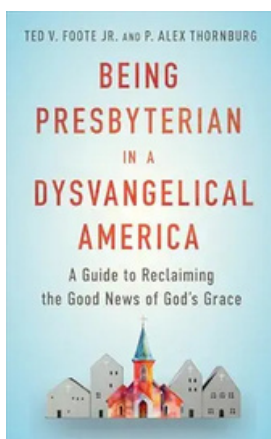
Bible Sunday School

d365 is a daily devotion written for youth and adults. The devotion follows a five-step format – **Pause, Listen, Think, Pray, Go.**

The **Pause** step remains the same all week and is designed as a centering tool as you begin the devotion.

The **Listen** step is the scripture passage for the day, using the Common English Bible translation. The **Think** step is the devotional thought by the week's writer.

The **Pray** step is the start of a prayer that you can expand into your own conversation with God. The **Go** step is a call to action – launching you from this moment toward acting on what you have heard.

As you read the thoughts of the writers, think about your own response to the scripture for the day. Let the writer's words serve as background for your own conversation with God.

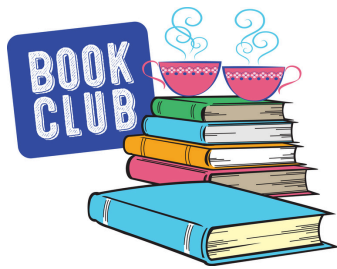


Looking Ahead to Summer

First Presbyterian Book Club

Thursday, May 14 @ 2:00 PM in the Parlor

May's book promises to be an interesting read about a subject we have not covered previously. *Carthage: A New History* by Eve MacDonald is a new history of ancient Rome's famous rival Carthage; known as the jewel of North Africa and as the home of Hannibal and his war elephants. For six hundred years, the city of Carthage dominated the western Mediterranean. Founded in the ninth century BCE, by the third century BCE, it had grown into the area's largest and richest empire. For over a century, it clashed with Rome for supremacy over the region, but finally fell to Rome and was razed. In this new history of Carthage, MacDonald restores the story of Carthage to its rightful place in the history of the ancient world, reclaiming a lost culture.

The book selected for the month of June is a biography of the queen of England, *Elizabeth: The Struggle for the Throne* by David Starkey. In this book the author concentrates on Queen Elizabeth I's formative years from her birth in 1533 to her accession to the throne in 1558. Starkey shows how her experiences of danger and adventure formed her remarkable character and shaped her opinions and beliefs. Here also is a fresh look at the rivalry between the daughters of Henry VIII, Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth. Starkey's close attention to detail and vivid storytelling combine to produce a narrative that reads like a novel. Meticulously researched, *Elizabeth* is a masterpiece of biography. It is often said that history provides the exact person needed for the times. One could say this about Queen Elizabeth I.

Come join us on Thursday, May 14th as we discuss what we have learned about the ancient empire of Carthage. It should prove to be interesting.
