Session Update

The Session met in March and April. We have been working on resolving some back issues and continuing to move forward. Communion was served on March 6, April 3,14,& 17.

We promoted the One Great Hour of Sharing through a "blue-out" day and inserts in bulletins. There was an Easter egg hunt held for the children on April 9, 2022; the

children had palms to wave on Palm Sunday.

We had a "clean-up day" prior to Easter Sunday with several church members helping around the church building. Our website has been updated, but we are still waiting to get an official domain name. We are in the process of updating the streaming service for us to be able to continue to stream the Sunday morning and other important days over Facebook Live.

We recently had a luncheon after church to honor our employees and have a wonderful time of fellowship with those in attendance. Susan has decided to wait until 2024 for her Sabbatical leave. She is working with the Presbyterian foundation to come and speak with us.

The stained glass repair is scheduled to start in June or July. It is a very specialized process that can be affected by weather and availability of technicians. The surge protection device has been installed. The internet cable in Reverend Susan's office will be moved to the sanctuary for better internet access in the sanctuary.

The FPC Book Club will meet on May 12th at 2:00 pm in the church parlor. The book we will be discussing is *Sky Pilot: Francis Gary Powers, The U-2 Incident and a Controversial Cold War Legacy* by Francis Gary Powers, Jr and Keith Dunnavant. Francis Gary Powers, Jr is the son of the famed U-2 pilot Gary Powers, whose U-2 spy plane was shot down over Russia while on a spying mission for the CIA. The book, based on newly available information, presents the facts and dispels



misinformation about the crash of the plane, the trial for spying, and the resulting prison sentence of Powers to a Russian prison. The authors have written this new account of Powers' life based on files that had not been previously available. An interesting side bar is that the subject of the film, *Bridge of Spies*, staring Tom Hanks is about the controversy over the swap of an American-held Russian spy for Gary Powers. The book selection for June is *How the South Won the War* by Heather Cox Richardson. Although the North won the Civil War, ending slavery and giving the country a new birth of freedom, the author argues that the system that sustained the South moved West and established a foot hold, thus giving a new birth of white male oligarchy. Settlers from the East and South pushed into the West seizing lands from the Mexican-Americans and the Native Americans cementing new racial hierarchies. Later the Conservative Movement led by Westerners Barry Goldwater, Richard Nixon and Ronald Reagan, worked with the Dixiecrats to embrace the ideology of the Confederacy. Looking forward to seeing you May 12th for another interesting discussion. Our book this month has a Milledgeville connection that will be fun to explore.-Millie Murphy

This book has been fascinating and we are taking our time to savor it. We hope a number of folks will join us in this study. If you do not wish to participate in the pot luck, the discussions begin about 7:00 P.M. Please join us whether you have the book or not! The book is available on Amazon.

Broken Signposts: How Christianity Makes Sense of the World:

N. T. Wright argues that every world view must explain seven "signposts," indicators inherent to humanity: Justice, Spirituality, Relationships, Beauty, Freedom, Truth, and Power.

If we do not live up to these ideals, our societies and individual lives become unbalanced, creating anger and frustration—negative emotions that divide us from ourselves and from God, he contends. Using the Gospel of John as his source, Wright shows how Christianity defines each signpost and illuminates why we so often see them as being "broken" and unattainable.

Drawing on the wisdom of the Gospels, Wright explains why these signposts are fractured and damaged and how Christianity provides the vision, guidance, and hope for making them whole once again, ultimately healing ourselves and our world. -Joel Burns
